DECISION ON PETITION FOR REINSTATEMENT

I. INTRODUCTION

This matter came before the Court on a petition for reinstatement to the practice of law filed by Petitioner, Steven James Foster (Petitioner). The Court finds that Petitioner has demonstrated by clear and convincing evidence that he possesses present moral qualifications for reinstatement and present ability and learning in the general law. Therefore, the Court recommends that Petitioner be reinstated to the practice of law in the State of California.

II. PERTINENT PROCEDURAL HISTORY

Petitioner initiated this proceeding on April 30, 2004, by filing a Petition for Reinstatement with the State Bar Court.

The State Bar of California (State Bar) was represented in this matter by Deputy Trial Counsel Eli D. Morgenstern of the Office of the Chief Trial Counsel. Petitioner represented himself.

Petitioner supplemented his petition by filing on September 17, 2004, proof of passage of the Multi-State Professional Responsibility Exam.

The State Bar filed a Non-Opposition to Petitioner's Petition for Reinstatement on September 20, 2004.

The Court took this matter under submission immediately thereafter.



III. FINDINGS OF FACT

The following factual findings are based on the Petition and Supplement to Petition.

A. <u>Background</u>

Petitioner was admitted to the practice of law in California on December 11, 1987. Effective April 1, 2001, Petitioner resigned from the State Bar of California without charges pending.²

Petitioner was admitted to the practice of law in the State of Colorado on May 9, 1991.

B. Passage of the Multistate Professional Responsibility Examination

Petitioner took and passed the Multistate Professional Responsibility Examination ("MPRE") on August 13, 2004.

C. Present Learning and Ability in the General Law

From February 26, 2001, to the date he filed his petition for reinstatement, Petitioner had been self-employed as an attorney in Boulder, Colorado.

Petitioner has also complied with continuing legal education requirements of the Colorado Supreme Court. Between April 2001 through July 2003, Petitioner has taken more than 69 credit hours of CLE courses covering a variety of topics, including professional ethics, estate planning, appellate practice, and client relations.

D. Present Moral Qualifications

1. Employment Subsequent to Resignation

Since the effective date of his resignation to the date of filing his petition for reinstatement, Petitioner has been the president of Steven J. Foster, P.C., an entity providing legal services. At no time has the Colorado State Bar disciplined Petitioner.

Petitioner states in his petition that he is honest, trustworthy, loyal and obeys the

IV. CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Petitioner has the burden of establishing by clear and convincing evidence that he has passed a professional responsibility examination, has present ability and learning in the general law, and has present moral qualifications for readmission. (Rules Proc. of State Bar, rule 665.)

A. Present Learning and Ability in the General Law

Petitioner has passed the MPRE and has completed over 69 hours of continuing legal education courses in a variety of legal areas. Additionally, since resigning, Petitioner has been the president of a professional corporation which provides legal services.

Based on these facts, the Court finds that Petitioner has demonstrated by clear and convincing evidence that he has present learning and ability in the general law.

B. Present Moral Character

Petitioner's assertion that he is honest and trustworthy is uncontradicted. Furthermore, the fact that Petitioner has worked as the president of a professional corporation providing legal services for approximately four years in Colorado without discipline is also uncontradicted.

Based on these facts, the Court finds that Petitioner has demonstrated by clear and convincing evidence that he has present moral qualifications for reinstatement.

V. RECOMMENDATION

For the foregoing reasons, the Court concludes that Petitioner has sustained his burden of demonstrating the requirements necessary for reinstatement by clear and convincing evidence. Therefore, the Court recommends that the petition for reinstatement be GRANTED and that Petitioner, STEVEN JAMES FOSTER, be reinstated as a member of the State Bar of California upon payment of the required fees and taking the oath required by law.
